PUBLIC POLICY

Attacks against Planned Parenthood From AAUW CA Public Policy

By now you are aware of the attacks against Planned Parenthood. So what is AAUW's response? As evidenced in our member-adopted Public Policy Program, AAUW is a longtime supporter of reproductive rights. We know Planned Parenthood values the health and safety of its patients above all else, and has high-quality standards for their lifesaving tissue donation programs.

To show our support, AAUW joined 92 organizations in signing a letter to Congress informing them that we stand with Planned Parenthood and the women they serve every day. AAUW has also joined 96 organizations on a coalition letter opposing congressional efforts to defund Planned Parenthood, and sent our own letter to the Hill urging a "no" vote. We will be scoring this vote in our AAUW Action Fund Congressional Voting Record.

Have you ever wondered how you could support AAUW's mission to empower women and girls? One of the easiest ways to do that is to become part of AAUW's "Two-Minute Activist" where you can make your voice heard in Congress.

Since AAUW's founding in 1881, our members have examined and taken positions on the fundamental issue of the day--educational, social, economic, and political. The messages you send through the Two-Minute Activist tool play an important role in the work we do. As an Action Network Subscriber, you will receive urgent e-mail notices to contact your members of Congress, find detailed information on legislation currently under consideration, and write letters to the editor of your local paper.

You can sign up for the Two-Minute Activist on the AAUW website. First go to the AAUW website at www.aauw.org then click on the link "Get Involved" at the top of the page. You will see a page that has a link that says "Take Action Online". This will lead you to the page that gives you the instructions to sign up. You should receive an email from AAUW telling you that you have successfully signed up. If you don't receive this email you might want to check your spam or junk folder.

After you have signed up you will have the opportunity to send messages regarding issues that AAUW supports to Senators Dianne Feinstein, Barbara Boxer & Representative Jackie Speier in Congress plus other departments in the government such as the Department of Labor.

By joining the AAUW Acton Network, you will belong to a dedicated community of members and supporters who break through barriers for all women and children.

BOOK NOTES

The Invention of Wings, by Sue Monk Kidd

If you haven't read this best-selling book yet, you might want to put it on your "to read" list. The historical novel is set in Charleston in 1803 and juxtaposes the experiences of two girls over decades of their lives. One is a young slave girl; the other is the daughter of a slave-owning family who becomes an abolitionist. The world they live in and the challenges they face are well described and the personalities of the various girls and women we meet in the book are quite compelling.

For many, an interesting aspect of the book is that its heroine, Sarah Grimke, is a historical figure who worked with her sister Angeline and Angeline's husband, Theodore Weld, to advance the civil rights of both black and women. Her work is considered to have influenced Harriet Beecher Stowe, yet not many have heard of her. Despite a completely inhospitable environment, the women in this novel had the ability to hope for and the courage to dare to achieve what seemed unattainable.

In an interview Sue Monk Kidd has said. "I know the world is different now, but I am a believer that girls and women and all of us really need all the stories of courage and daring we can get." In other words, she is an AAUW kind of woman!
