Project 90 Inc. Helps Men and Women Overcome Addictions

Our Public Policy/Current Events discussion group will introduce our members and guests to a local organization that provides intensive drug and alcohol treatment services to residents of San Mateo and Santa Clara Counties. The organization, Project 90. Inc, will be the subject of our meeting on Tuesday, January 10th from 10:30 a.m.-12 p.m. at the home of Sandra Shapiro.

John Jacovo, intake coordinator of the organization, will explain how Project 90, Inc. offers treatment for men and women suffering from drug and alcohol addictions as well as mental illness. It will also provide housing up to 18 months after treatment for those who are able to work full-time if they continue to receive services from Alcoholics and/or Narcotics Anonymous. As always, the meeting is free and open to all AAUW members and guests. Attendees who have new or gently used clothing may wish to bring them to the meeting to assist participants in the program preparing to return to work.

I Am Worth More

44 New Employers have signed onto White House Equal Pay Pledge

The White House announced 44 new employers signed on to the Equal Pay Pledge, bringing the total to over 100 businesses, who have committed to advance equal pay. AAUW commends these companies, which include eBay, AT&T, Yahoo, and Zillow Group. They join the ranks including Amazon and PepsiCo.

The provisions of the pledge include conducting a company-wide gender pay analysis, reviewing hiring and promotion processes to reduce unconscious bias, and including equal pay efforts into equity initiatives. Anheuser-Busch made news when they signed the pledge after urging from the public and AAUW members. We commend this measure as a significant step in reducing structural gender bias and closing the gender pay gap.

Office for Civil Rights highlights eight years of accomplishments The U.S. Department of Education's Office for Civil Rights (OCR) released two reports on Thursday, which highlight its accomplishments over the last eight years and the challenges that remain. As OCR's staffing levels reached an all-time low last fiscal year, a record 16,720 civil rights complaints were filed. Under the Obama Administration, OCR ensured strong enforcement of civil rights laws by resolving over 66,000 civil rights cases from 2009-16.

The office has played a key role in conducting civil rights investigations, providing technical assistance, and reducing discriminatory barriers for students. Last year, OCR released a Title IX coordinator resource guide, which helps coordinators to better understand and perform their important job of ensuring that learning environments are free from sex discrimination.

Under the Trump Administration, the future of OCR is uncertain; many speculate that Secretary of Education nominee, Betsy Demos, a right-wing conservative, may seek to downsize the office.

California Fact & Legend

Eleven of us had a delightful time at Sam's Castle for Private Tour & Tea. What a fun discovery, built in 1908 and furnished to the hilt, both beautifully and whimsically! We were shown around by Bridget Oates who literally wrote the book on the Castle.

A brief history of the castle begins with the 1906 San Francisco earthquake. Henry McCloskey, a San Francisco attorney, buys a plot of land in what is now the Sharp Park district of Pacifica in 1907. McCloskey hires architect Charles MacDougal to design an earthquake/fire-proof home to assuage the fears of his wife Emily McCloskey. Only 7 years later, in 1914, Henry McCloskey dies. Emily McCloskey remains at the castle for another year until her son Paul Norton McCloskey, Sr., finishes his studies at Stanford Law School.

The McCloskeys move and turn the keys to the castle over to Dr. Galen Richard Hickok and his wife, Minerva. Dr. Hickok, a Berkeley physician, intends to use the castle as a coastal medical facility. One day in August of 1920, police arrive at the castle to investigate a report that the castle was being used as a retreat for girls and women unwilling to become mothers.

Dr. Hickock is arrested at his Berkeley home that night and charged with performing illegal abortions. At his trial, the jury finds him guilty in 7 minutes; he is sentenced to serve 5 years at San Quentin. The castle is passed to his son, Max, who follows closely in his father's footsteps and winds up in San Quentin for the same offense.

In the 1920's the house was used as a restaurant and speakeasy that was raided numerous times. The last owner, Sam Mazza, passed peacefully at the age of 96, in 2002. Before his death, he establish the Sam Mazza charitable foundation with the castle as their headquarters.
