#### Joint AAUW/League of Women Voters Meeting Will Discuss Future of San Mateo County

"Envisioning the Future of San Mateo County" will be the subject of a joint meeting of our AAUW branch and the League of Women Voters of North and Central San Mateo County on Tuesday, October 22, at the Silicon Valley Foundation office, 1300 South El Camino Real, San Mateo.

The program, from 1 to 3 p.m., will feature a panel discussion by three civic leaders: County Supervisor Carole Groom; Adrienne Etherton, executive director of Sustainable San Mateo County; and Lee Michelson, CEO of the Sequoia Healthcare District. Members of AAUW and the League share a common concern about the country's future, and they will be encouraged to participate in the discussion afterwards.

Among the topics to be covered will be the county's changing demographics with an aging population and influx of younger, more heterogeneous workers and their families, and the recently approved Plan Bay Area.

The meeting is open to the general public as well as to AAUW and League members and their families. Free parking is available behind the building.
