The 2016 AAUW-San Mateo Branch Scholarship Reception was held at the SMCCCD Office at the College of San Mateo on May 7th. Six well-deserving women were recipients of the Ethel Gayman and Kathleen A. Smith Scholarships.

The Ethel Gayman Endowment Scholarships:

In 1991, Ethel Gayman, a long-time member of AAUW-San Mateo, left a bequest to the branch. This bequest was designated to provide funding for yearly scholarships to students from the three San Mateo County Community Colleges who continue their education at a four-year accredited college or university. Eligible applicants must have a minimum 3.5 grade point average, demonstrate financial need and be enrolled at their chosen university during the subsequent fall term. Each of this year's five scholarships is \$3,000.

The Kathleen A. Smith Memorial Scholarship:

In 2012, Kay Smith, another long-time member of AAUW-San Mateo, bequeathed \$50,000 to the branch. The board of directors voted to establish the Kathleen A. Smith Memorial Scholarship. The criteria for the scholarship are the same as those of the Ethel Gayman Endowment; and each year for ten years, one \$5,000 scholarship is awarded.

The 2016 Ethel Gayman Scholarship Recipients:

Leslie Castillo-Ortiz (Skyline) is a first generation college student who held a full-time job plus working part-time on week-ends while attending community college full time. She has been on the Dean's list and awarded membership in the Phi Theta Kappa Honor Society. She will be majoring in Kinesiology, with the goal of working in health care.

Exposing the Evildoers by Sue Lempert

In a recent column entitled "Exposing the Evildoers" Sue recounted examples of dark money, pervading the political system, and instances where money has poured in to fight efforts to improve the environment, health care and other national issues. She does this by reviewing three recent books focusing on the subjects. The meeting which is open to AAUW members, family and friends is especially appropriate as we approach this fall's very important election.

California State November 2016 Ballot Measures Pros & Cons

AAUW San Mateo Branch will hold a Pros & Cons Presentation on the November 2016 state ballot measures at the San Mateo County Community College District Board Room, 3401 CSM Dr. San Mateo, CA 94403 on Sept 26th, at 6:30 pm.

Pros & Cons is an impartial presentation of the ballot measures with a description of the measures and the arguments for and against them. The public is welcome to attend this event. We encourage AAUW members to invite their family and friends.

There are numerous ways a Ballot Measure can be placed on a ballot. The most common form is the *Citizen Initiated* ballot measure where groups collect signatures and once those signatures are collected, election officials place the measure on the ballot for a vote.

There are also *Legislative Initiated* ballot measures where the State Legislation refers them to the ballot so citizens may vote upon them. Each type of initiative may change the state constitution, become a state statute or both.

Propositions 51, 52, 53, 54, 55, 56, 57, 60, 61, 62, 63, 64, & 66 are all *Citizen Initiated ballot* measures. Proposition 58 is a *Legislative Initiated* ballot measure.

Laws already enacted by the State Legislature may be vetoed by the citizens through *referendums*. Veto referendums are placed on a ballot when citizens collect enough signatures to challenge the law. Proposition 67 is a veto referendum.

An Advisory Question is a type of ballot measure in which citizens vote on a non-binding question. The advisory question lets the Legislation know the opinion of the citizens in regard to an issue. Proposition 59 is an advisory question.

There are 17 state ballot measures on the November ballot. Included in this issue of the *Bayleaves* is a list of all of the 17 ballot measures plus a brief description of them. We encourage you to review this before the Pros & Cons presentation.

Ballot Measures on the November 2016 Ballot

- --Proposition 51, *California Public Education Facilities Bond Initiative* provides for funding for K-12 School and Community College Facilities.
- --Proposition 52, *California Medi-Cal Hospital Reimbursement Initiative*, ensuring that Medi-Cal fees would be directed to children's health services, Medi-Cal health care, and uninsured patient care.
- --Proposition 53, *California Public Vote on Bonds*, requiring voter approval before the state could issue more than \$2 billion in public infrastructure bonds that would require an increase in taxes or fees for repayment.
- --Proposition 54, *California Legislature Transparency Act* requires that every bill is published in print and online at least 72 hours prior to the legislative vote, that the legislature make audiovisual recordings of its proceedings and publish the recordings online, and allow any individual to record any open legislative proceedings either through audio or visual means and use these recordings without paying for such use.
- --Proposition 55, *California Tax Extension to Fund Education and Healthcare* would extend the temporary personal income tax increases approved in 2012 on incomes over \$250,000 for 12 years to be used for education and healthcare funding.
- --Proposition 56, *California Healthcare*, *Research and Prevention Tobacco Tax Amendment* increases cigarette tax by \$2.00 per pack, with equivalent increase on other tobacco products and E-cigarettes.
- --Proposition 57, *California Parole and Juvenile Trial Opportunity Modification* would increase parole chances for felons convicted of non-violent crimes and give them more opportunities to earn credits for good behavior. It would also allow judges, not prosecutors, to decide whether to try certain juveniles as adults in court.
- --Proposition 58, *California Multilingual Education Act* repeals most of the 1998 Prop 227, the "English in Public Schools" Initiative, allowing non-English languages to be used in public educational instruction.
- --Proposition 59, California Overturn of Citizens United Act Advisory Question asks: "Shall California's elected officials use all of their constitutional authority, including, proposing and ratifying one or more amendments to the United States Constitution, to overturn Citizens United v. F E C (2010) 558 U.S. 310, and other applicable judicial precedents, to allow the full regulation or limitation of campaign contributions and spending."

- --Proposition 60, *Condoms in Pornographic Films* requires performers in adult films to use condoms during filming of sexual intercourse.
- --Proposition 61, *California Drug Price Relief Act* regulates drug prices by requiring state agencies to pay the same prices as the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs (USDVA) pays for prescription drugs.
- --Proposition 62, *California Death Penalty Repeal* repeals the death penalty as maximum punishment for persons found guilty of murder and replaces it with life imprisonment without possibility of parole.
- --Proposition 63, *California "Safety for All" Gun Control* prohibits the possession of large capacity ammunition magazines and would require most individuals to pass a background check and obtain authorization from the Department of Justice to purchase ammunition.
- --Proposition 64, *California Marijuana Legalization* legalizes marijuana and hemp under state law and enacts certain sales and cultivation taxes.
- --Proposition 65, *California Carry-Out Bag Revenue* redirects money collected from the sale of carry-out bags by grocery or other retail stores to a special fund administered by the Wildlife Conservation Board.
- --Proposition 66, *California Death Penalty Procedure Regulation* changes procedures governing state court appeals and petitions challenging death penalty convictions and sentences and would make other voter approved measures related to death penalty null and void if this measure receives more affirmative votes.
- --Proposition 67, *California Plastic Bag Ban Referendum* upholds or ratifies the contested legislation banning plastic bags that was enacted by the California State Legislature under the name Senate Bill 270.
