InnVision Shelter Network Program Director Will Discuss Services for Homeless

Our Public Policy/Current Events discussion group will open up 2014 meetings with a talk on services for the homeless in San Mateo and Santa Clara Counties by Jacob Stone, program director of InnVision Shelter Network, on Tuesday, January 21st from 10:30 a.m.-12 noon at the home of Betty Bernstein.

The meeting will cover the many services offered homeless families and individuals in the two counties. Each night the agency provides shelter and a wide variety of services for men, women, and children in its 18 shelters from Daly City to San Jose. As recently as 2012, ninety percent of the families and 60 percent of the single adults served graduated from their rapid re-housing program to permanent housing.

In December we were able to provide a substantial number of gift cards as Christmas gifts for shelter residents. As always, this Public Policy meeting is open to all AAUW members, family and friends.
