SAVE THE DATE

Joint AAUW/League of Women Voters Meeting
Will Discuss Future of San Mateo County

"Envisioning the Future of San Mateo County" will be the subject of a joint meeting of our AAUW branch and the League of Women Voters of North and Central San Mateo County on Tuesday, October 22nd at the Silicon Valley Foundation office, 1300 South El Camino Real, San Mateo.

The program from 1 to 3 p.m. will feature a panel discussion by Supervisor Carole Groom. Adrienne Etherton, executive director of Sustainable San Mateo County, and Lee Michelson, CEO of the Sequoia Healthcare District.

Choice of this subject was based on recognition of the county's rapidly changing demographics caused, in part, by an aging population and increase in the number of younger multi-ethnic groups moving into the county. The high cost of available housing and the lack of affordable housing to accommodate the workforce that is needed to work here add to the complexity of the problems facing the county.

The meeting is open to members of both organizations and to the general public.

SCHOLARSHIP NEWS Judy Laird

The reception for our scholarship recipients on June 1 was a lovely affair. Five of the seven recipients, together with a few parents, were able to attend, and as always, it was interesting to hear their stories.

The Kathleen A. Smith Memorial scholarship of \$5,000 was awarded to <u>Aye Thwin</u> who came to the U.S. from Burma at the age of 16. She received an AA in biochemistry from Skyline, and will be attending UC Berkeley. Her ultimate goal is to be a pediatrician.

The Ethel Gayman scholarships, in the amount of \$3,000 each, were awarded to the following:

<u>Marissa Buell</u> was raised in Southern California in a family using only solar and wind power. At Canada College she was a member of WISE (Women in Science and Engineering) and she will study mechanical engineering at UCLA.

Gabriel Denham, a 4.0 GPA student at CSM, was very active in campus activities and tutored in math and science. He is currently participating in a summer internship at Cornell and this fall will be entering Columbia University. He plans to complete a doctoral program in physics.

<u>Leon Gutierrez</u>, born in Mexico, found his love for mathematics when he participated in Math Olympics at his high school here in the U.S. He majored in math at Skyline and plans to continue in that major at UC Berkeley.

<u>San Htun</u>, born in Burma, studied computer science in Singapore and worked as a project leader in a hospital prior to coming to the US. She plans to complete a bachelor's degree in biochemistry and continue to medical school.

<u>Mandira Shrestha</u>, from Nepal, was a math tutor and maintained a 4.0 GPA at CSM. She intends to major in electrical engineering and technology at UC Berkeley.

<u>Thoe Sin</u> emigrated from Burma in 2009, and while at Skyline was a 4.0 GPA student and earned an AA in chemistry-physics. She plans to continue in this field at UC San Diego.

BOOK NOTES Judy Laird

AH, PARIS. . . three books that will give you an insight into the life and times of Paris in different eras.

David McCullough's ambitious <u>The Greater</u> <u>Journey: Americans in Paris</u> is a well-researched, nonfiction book about the extraordinary influence of Paris as the intellectual, scientific, and artistic capital of the western world. Among others, in the 1900's such notables as Samuel F.B Morse, August Saint-Gaudens, John Singer Sargent and Mary Cassatt are illuminated.

In Edward Rutherfurd's <u>Paris - The Novel</u>, history becomes amazingly alive through the characters and families in pivotal times from medieval years to 21st century. You feel the tension between aristocrats and the working class, clashing family dynamics and religious fervent gone to extremes.

<u>A Paris Wife</u> by Paula McLain captures the essence of the early twenties in Paris via the story of Hadley, the first wife of Ernest Hemmingway. The reader is there with her in the exciting social swirl and the unraveling of a marriage.

If you have been Paris, you may want to revisit it. If you haven't been to Paris, you may want to plan an itinerary. Or, you may just want to view the DVD of *Midnight in Paris*, written and directed by Woody Allen, and starring Owen Wilson, Rachel McAdams, Marion Cotillard, Léa Seydoux and Adrien Brody for an instant, memorable trip!
