# Luncheon at Delancey St. Restaurant Offers Members Much Food for Thought

After a hearty four-course luncheon at Delancey Street's handsome restaurant in San Francisco, a good turnout of branch members, husbands and guests enjoyed a fascinating talk about the organization's amazing history and operation.

For the last five years our branch has provided volunteers and a small amount of financial support for the vocabulary program in the Choices section of the Women's Correctional Facility in Redwood City. Since the Choices program is based on Delancey Street principles, we decided to hold a luncheon at their remarkable restaurant on the Embarcadero in San Francisco.

Our first speaker, Sabrina Fontanilla, acknowledged that she had been a 25-year heroin addict before entering Choices and then Delancey Street. explained how the organization successfully operates without any outside govenment funding to turn people like her into successful self-supporting men and women. Each resident is provided at least three vocational skills, such as chefs or servers in the restaurant, print shop operators or moving company workers in the organization's highly regarded moving company. Sabrina explained how she had worked her way up to be in charge of private dining, and it was, in fact, she who made all of the arrangements for our luncheon. She is but one of more than 350 people who are currently living and working at Delancey Street at this time.

Next, we heard a very moving presentation from Maria Garcia who spent over a year in Choices, but did not

go to Delancey Street. Instead, she was transferred to a federal prison in the East Bay and then to a halfway house in the Tenderloin. Despite all of this she was able to use the valuable lessons she learned in Choices to turn her life around. She told of her very busy life today as a graduate student in psychology at San Francisco State University and her part-time work for a non-profit organization, Root and Rebound in Berkeley, which helps formerly incarcerated women like her successfully re-enter their communities. All of the board members who attended the luncheon were so impressed with Maria that we voted to offer her a free one year's membership in our AAUW branch. We expect that for awhile she will be too busy with work and her studies to be very active, but we do hope that eventually she will be able to participate in our many programs. Betty Bernstein
