Presidents' Message

AAUW funded 3.7 million dollars in fellowships and grants to 250 woman scholars and nonprofit organizations for the 2017-2018 year due to the generosity of AAUW members and supporters. Several San Mateo Branch members attended the AAUW Funds Fall luncheon to honor some of the recipients at the Basque Cultural Center in South San Francisco. 26 recipients are studying in California universities or doing projects in our area. Five attended the luncheon and gave fascinating accounts of their projects. We all felt pride in AAUW for enabling these young women to continue their studies in diverse fields which will positively impact their communities.

- Allissa Walter, a Georgetown University Ph.d history student, is researching documents at Stanford obtained after the fall of Saddam Hussein. The AAUW grant even pays for child care for her two month-old child while she is pouring over documents in Arabic.
- Zesemayat Mekonnen, a medical student at UC San Francisco, is exploring the effects of air pollution and poverty on birth outcomes in California urban counties. Her goal is to become an academic physician focused on addressing health disparities.
- Adele Kuzmiakova from Brazil is a Ph.d Stanford engineering student researching models of urban mobility and social dynamics.
- Chndyli Rogel from the Phillippines is obtaining an MA in International Policy and Development at the Monterey Institute of International Studies. She hopes to use her expertise to create and sustain poverty reduction policies and programs in the Philippines.
- Girl Scouts of Northern California received a Community Action grant for their after school program Girls Go Tech which delivers hands on science and technology experiences to 30 girls in grades K-5 in Santa Rosa and Windsor.

The Simple Truth About the Gender Pay Gap

The gender pay gap is not fake news. AAUW just crunched the numbers on new data from the U.S. Census Bureau and we have the facts you need to arm yourself to fight for fair pay.

What's new about the pay gap? That's the problem: nothing.

Despite incremental change the latest data show that women working full time, year-round in the United States are still paid 80 percent of what their male colleagues are paid. Clearly the gap is closing at a glacial pace.

Is there a pay gap even if you compare women and men in the same job? YES.

Data show that in almost every occupation men are paid more than women.

Why don't women just choose higher-paying jobs? If only it were that easy!

Researchers have found that pay drops for the entire field when women enter traditionally "male" fields.

When will the pay gap close?

According to our latest projections, the gender pay gap won't close until 2119. Women and families can't afford to wait that long.

Ready to take action? Here's what you can do now!

- Learn what your state is doing to achieve equal pay. Then push your elected officials for more action.
- Bring AAUW's salary negotiation workshops to your community. Help provide women with the tools they need to secure a fair salary.
- Urge your members of Congress to pass legislation to close the gender pay gap.
 Women and families need federal action on equal pay.

AAUW San Mateo Branch Supports Women in San Mateo County Jail

AAUW's mission is to advance equity for women and girls. There are many ways we do this. One of the ways our branch supports this mission is to sponsor a class for women in the Maple Street Correctional Facility in Redwood City.

One of the programs at the jail is called *Choices* where the women must interview to be part of the program. *Choices* provides classes and counseling for the women that they attend all day, 5 days a week. If they don't have their high school diploma or GED, they must study for and take the tests to receive their GED. They sign a contract that, after they have served their time, they will go into a program of at least 6 months such as *Hope House* or *Delancey Street*. The mission of *Choices* is to enable the women to avoid going back to the same environment that landed them in jail in the first place.

For the past 7 years members of our branch, Betty Bernstein, Shirley Roberson and Gayle Hardt, have been supervising a vocabulary class in the *Choices* program. The class was originally sponsored by the College of San Mateo. CSM was unable to continue sponsoring the class so the San Mateo Branch of AAUW took over.

The vocabulary course consists of 6 self-study books the women use to learn the words. They range in difficulty from 4th grade to college level vocabulary. The women take a placement test to determine which book they will study first.

Some of the women are a little intimidated when they start the class but after a few weeks they gain confidence and truly enjoy the challenge. After they complete each section of their book, they are given a certificate. In some cases, this is the first certificate they have earned. It's inspiring to see how these women change their lives through *Choices*. It's a program that works and we're proud to be part of it.
