The Gender Pay Gap Starts to Slowly Close

In 2017, 42 states, plus Puerto Rico and Washington, D.C., have bills to address the gender pay gap. While not all bills passed, this growing activity shows that red, blue, and purple states realize that the pay gap is real and that something needs to be done about it.

California, Colorado, Delaware, Nevada, Oregon, and Puerto Rico enacted legislation designed to close the pay gap through various strategies. These included bills to prohibit employers from using a job applicant's salary history during the hiring process. Dozens of other states introduced (though did not pass) similar legislation, and New York Gov. Andrew Cuomo issued an executive order addressing the issue for state government employees.

Employers asking applicants about past wages can have major repercussions on future pay. For a worker who was underpaid at her last job, using that salary to determine her next paycheck only sustains that pay gap. Salary history can therefore inadvertently introduce discrimination into the recruitment process. The work of states to curtail this practice will go a long way in our fight for pay equity.

Another way lawmakers can level the playing field is to ensure employees have access to information regarding salary information on all employees. Many states already protect workers who inquire about salary information, but this year Colorado, Nevada, and Puerto Rico enacted or expanded those protections. The fight is not over but in the past two years major progress has been made. California, in particular, has been a leader in closing the gap.

We should be proud of the progress made in our state. Let's hope that ultimately the "pay gap" will be a thing of the past and AAUW can focus on other areas where women's roles in education and employment can be improved both by building awareness of the need for change and by legislation where and when necessary. Public Policy/Current Events Betty Bernstein

Nearly every family faces a variety of health problems that may include mental illness. It affects people of all ages and income levels and is especially common among our nation's homeless population.

On Tuesday, January 9th our Public Policy/Current Events discussion group is fortunate to have as our guest speaker Melissa Platt, Executive Director of the San Mateo County Mental Health Association. She will discuss the services that are available to residents of our county and especially to those who have become homeless because of their illness. The meeting which is open to all AAUW members and guests will be held on Tuesday, Jan. 9th at 10:30 am, at the home of Diane Silven.

California Fact and Legend

The California Fact and Legend Group took an interesting tour of the Presidio Officers' Club in San Francisco in December. It was renovated three years ago although they left part of the original 1780 walls uncovered for viewing. Now instead of being a gallery, there are classrooms and it's an accredited historical museum. They also enjoyed a tasty meal at *Arguella* Restaurant located at the Presidio.

Senator Diane Feinstein was responsible for presenting the bill and arguing successfully for the Presidio to become a National Park—the only self-sustaining one in the nation and the only one located within city limits.

The California Voter's Choice Act

San Mateo County is one of 14 California counties that will conduct All-Mailed Ballot/Vote Center elections under Senate Bill 450, the California Voter's Choice Act. The June 5, 2018 Direct Primary Election is the County's first election that will conform to the Act.

Starting in 2018, all registered voters in San Mateo County will be mailed their ballot 29 days before the election. There are 3 methods to cast your ballot. You can vote and mail your ballot in the postage-paid return envelope on or before Election Day; you can return your voted ballot to a secure Ballot Dropoff Box; or at a Vote Center.

Vote Centers look and feel like polling places, but provide additional services and options for voters. You can go to any Vote Center in San Mateo County to vote.

At the Vote Center you can vote on an accessible voting machine; vote on a paper ballot; access election materials in a range of languages; receive assistance from staff fluent in English, Spanish, Chinese, Filipino, Japanese or Hindi; drop off your ballot; receive a replacement ballot; and register to vote or update registration information through Election Day.

The County wants to hear your thoughts on the Voter's Choice Act and the placement of Vote Centers and Ballot Drop-off Boxes throughout San Mateo County. There will be a public meeting for comments on January 18th at 1:00 pm, at the Board of Supervisors' Chambers, Hall of Justice, 400 County Center, Redwood City, CA 94063. Let your voice be heard by attending this important public meeting.
