As the Board begins a new year refreshed from the summer break, we look forward to working towards carrying out AAUW's mission of advancing equity for women and girls through advocacy, education and research. We're also excited about events planned for our members and looking forward to celebrating the 100th anniversary of the 19th Amendment granting women the right to vote. This month our Community College scholarship recipients will be headed to 4-year colleges and universities. Our scholarship committee of ten reviewed 74 applications and interviewed ten finalists to arrive at the final six students to each receive a \$5,000 scholarship.

We awarded three scholarships to Skyline graduates: Abiodun Foresythe, a biology major, attending Oral Roberts University; Cara Loo, a psychology major, attending UCLA; and Kristen Gray who will achieve her dream of majoring in dietetics at San Francisco State University. We also awarded one scholarship to a CSM student, Antoneil Carter, attending UCLA with a social sciences major; and two to Cañada students, Jenna Arlie and Dalila Gonzalez Mejia. Jenna will attend Northern Arizona University majoring in mathematics and Dalila will study biomedical engineering at UC San Diego on her way to obtain an MD. Several committee members attended the colleges' awards night including Gerhild Klein and Judy Bloom at the Cañada ceremony.

In her thank-you note to the Branch, Kristen Gray of Skyline noted, "I am aware of some of the things you do for our community, particularly in support of education." Kristen hopes that "someday I will be able to donate to students in need like myself."

Thank you to committee leaders Denise Strehl and Judy Bloom and to the rest of the committee for your hard work. The scholarships are made possible by bequests from former members Ethel Gayman and Kathleen Smith.

In the Fall, regional branches will be celebrating AAUW Fund recipients. Thank you to all of you who have donated to the Funds and be sure to attend our area's Fund's event on October 3 to meet Fund recipients.

Transportation Options as We Age

Do you ever miss out on an AAUW activity or meeting because you don't want to or can't drive? One solution is to find another AAUW member who is attending the same event but that might not work out. Here are a few solutions for those trips and other transportation needs.

- With a smartphone, you can download the apps for Lyft and Uber which have several low cost options for seniors.
- Last year San Mateo piloted a Senior Rides program called *Get Around*. San Mateo residents, 60 years plus, are eligible for \$5 one-way rides. For more information, call 522-7490 or register at www.sanmateorec.org.
- Another resource for seniors is *Go Go Grandparent*, they can be reached at 1-855-464-6872 or www.gogograndparent.com. Fees are based on distance and time.

- For transportation to medical appointments and shopping in San Mateo County, Stanford Hospital and the VA, Get Up & Go, is a free service for older adults. This service, of the Peninsula Jewish Community Center, is available weekdays, except Wednesday. For information call 650-378-2750 or www.pjcc.org/learn/older/getupandgo.html.
- Another resource for seniors who need help shopping is SASH: Shopping Assistance for Seniors. Located at the San Mateo Senior Center, call 650- 522-7494 for more information.
- The Villages of San Mateo County is another option for help with shopping, and other services for seniors. The Villages is a nonprofit grassroots "virtual village" fueled by volunteers who help older adults continue to live in their homes by providing community linkages and volunteer services.

Rides are included in the annual membership dues at no additional charge and are provided by trained and background-checked volunteers using their own cars. Rides can be to anywhere on the mid-peninsula up to 10 times per month, including one trip to the airport. To schedule these, you need to call one week in advance.

Mid-Peninsula Village and Sequoia Village also have regular social events which build relationships among our members and volunteers, including offering monthly speakers and field trips. Other services provided with membership include a safety check of the member's home, including installation of grab bars and smoke detectors, minor home repairs, help with simple home and yard chores, technology assistance with computers and cell phones, etc. The cost is \$600/year, and subsidized memberships are available based on income need.

The Villages of San Mateo County recently elevated the Associate membership to Social Membership. For \$300/year, a social member can participate in all the events and excursions that the Village offers.

If a social member has a significant accident, that member can access full membership benefits for 60 days. Upon verification of this accident, the social member is eligible for the same home safety evaluation with related safety modifications, free rides, etc. as full members enjoy.

Twelve AAUW Members Go to Jail Betty Bernstein

In May, twelve of our Public Policy Group members had a unique experience when they went to jail, in fact, two jails, the San Mateo County's Women's and Men's Correctional Facilities in Redwood City, to see and hear about the Choices programs. Choices is the program for 24 women and more than 90 men that emphasize life changes rather than punishment.

The tour was led by Adrian Maldonado, the director of both Choices programs. He explained how he and the counselors had all been incarcerated earlier in their lives so were familiar with the issues prisoners have to face on their road to rehabilitation.

Both jails have extensive medical facilities that include medical and psychiatric doctors and nurses to service jail inmates. The California jails and prisons have become replacements, to a large extent, for psychiatric facilities that were closed.

Some in the group were surprised to find the women inmates are articulate, with a wide range of ages in the group. Most of the women were high school graduates, and the majority have children. If necessary, the women were working on their GED through the help of Project Read and other volunteers, including the AAUW members who go to jail every week to teach a vocabulary class. A few of the other classes are parenting, how to avoid abuse, yoga, AA & NA, and resume writing.

One highlight of the visit of the men's Choices unit was an opportunity to meet a charming, elderly, gentleman who taught poetry. He spoke of the great talent he found in the men and how he compiles collections of their work to take with them when they leave. Another surprise was that the men in Choices live together without regard to race or gang affiliation, contrary to the general population.

Everyone agreed that the jail tour was a memorable, eye-opening experience and were happy to have had the opportunity to participate in it.
