Public Policy

For the first time in five years our Public Policy Group has returned to a subject covered at an earlier meeting. At that time we learned about the many services offered to local residents from a volunteer organization called the *Villages of San Mateo County*. It is especially helpful for those who no longer have the ability to drive but also offers a number of other programs that will enable participants to remain independent and active in their community.

Our speaker, Eric Hanson, volunteer coordinator for the Villages, will discuss the full range of services available to senior participants. The meeting will be in person on Tues, April 12 at 10:30 am at Diane Silven's home, 730 Ave, Burlingame. Please bring proof of both vaccination and booster shots.

Women Take on More Student Debt than Men - But are Paid Less AAUW Public Policy

Between 1976 and 2014 the price of college attendance more than doubled, but household incomes barely budged. Today most students must bridge the gap between income and cost with student loans—followed by student debt. 68% of students borrow money to pay for their undergraduate education.

Women take on greater debt than men to start, with Black women taking on the most substantial debt burden. Then, when women graduate, their debt repayment collides with the gender wage gap and racial wealth gap to make it harder for them to repay their loans; women hold almost two-thirds of the outstanding student loan debt in the United States. They are also more likely to struggle economically during repayment. As a result, women often put off saving for retirement, buying a home, or starting a business.

The Biden Administration is increasing the number of people whose loans will be forgiven under the *Public Service Loan Forgiveness Program*. Public service is defined as teachers, nurses, first responders, service members, government, and non-profit employees, among others. This is a start but more needs to be done.

AAUW members can help to reduce women's student loan debt burden by contacting their representatives. Here are a few of the areas where we can make a difference:

- Congress must protect and expand Pell
 Grants for low-income students to reduce
 the amount of student loan debt they must
 take on to complete a degree.
- State and federal legislators should increase funding for public colleges and universities and support efforts to move toward tuitionand debt-free options for students.
- The department of education and lawmakers should make it easier for students to enroll in income-driven repayment options to help mitigate some women's financial difficulties.
- Institutions can address the academic and financial needs of traditional and nontraditional students, such as access to childcare. Learn more at AAUW, https://www.aauw.org/resources/research/deeper-in-debt/.
