# Co-President's Message

As we near the middle of our 91<sup>st</sup> year as a Branch of AAUW, we note that there have been many accomplishments. For the first 40 years, members fund-raised to establish 2 named endowments for graduate students which are still helping women. They held teas and luncheons to fund local scholarships for undergraduates. They formed a babysitting co-op which brought in many new members and freedom from being housebound.

Fast forward to the '70s and we see that Title IX was a major motivator for women to reach for equality. Legal advocacy is still of major importance. Equal pay protection was a central objective for our lobbying.

The '90s brought a California program called *Tech Trek* (STEM camps) to college campuses and proved so successful for rising 8<sup>th</sup> graders, that it became a nationwide opportunity. Following in Tech Trek's footsteps, *Speech Trek* was implemented. Soon, there will be new *Trek* called *Gov Trek*, for high school juniors and seniors to promote public service careers and more women running for office.

Other national programs became available including the National Conference for College Women Student Leadership (NCCWSL), a student leadership meeting for college women, and Start Smart for financial literacy.

At our branch, we implemented the *Ethel Gayman Scholarship* for junior college students enrolling in a 4-year college or university because of an endowment from our member, Ethel Gayman. Ethel was a dedicated member of our branch for many years. Her generous donation to our branch will allow us to give out scholarships for years to come.

Now the question is, will you volunteer a few hours to join the scholarship, NCCWSL and Tech Trek committees? Without more help, we may not be able to continue to choose recipients for these great programs.

# AAUW California Quits Twitter Sandi Gabe, AAUW CA President

On November 9, 2022, the AAUW California Board of Directors voted to terminate its account with Twitter effective immediately. This proposal was brought forth by the Public Policy Committee and approved following thoughtful and careful discussion.

The decision was based on a number of actions taken by Elon Musk both before and since his takeover of this social media platform. Primarily, we are concerned that the incidences of hate speech; disinformation, discriminatory and misogynistic rhetoric; and the spread of dangerous and divisive theories will continue to rise under his stewardship.

AAUW California can no longer be associated with this platform. We believe this action affirms AAUW California's commitment to advancing fair and equitable treatment for everybody in our diverse society and its opposition to hate, violence, and harassment against members of any demographic group.

# **November General Meeting**

Our first in-person general meeting since COVID was very successful. It featured a presentation by Terri Chin, Redwood City Homeless Coordinator, about how our county combines efforts with private organizations such as Samaritan House, Life Moves and San Mateo County Mental Health Department to reduce homelessness.

The plan to reduce unhoused people is working well. Such ideas as safe parking, temporary shelters, and permanent housing options are all part of the efforts. A team of workers on the streets adds to the success of the project by employing some of the formerly unhoused. More housing units are being built now to open in 2023, with others in the pipeline.

Our Public Policy group has met with the leaders and representatives of Samaritan House and Life Moves and it was gratifying to see that everyone is working together to make a difference in people's lives.

General meetings are jointly planned with the Mid-Peninsula AAUW. The next meeting will be held on ZOOM in January and will feature a speaker from the San Mateo County Historical Society on the topic of immigration in San Mateo County.

#### **Gov Trek**

Gov Trek is a new AAUW California program to encourage girls to seek public service careers and to run for public office. Participants will take part in five 2-hour webinars on Saturdays in the spring. Girls will be admitted on a first come, first served basis.

Do you know any young California women in their junior or senior year of high school? They might be your grandchildren, neighbors, or acquaintances who are all eligible to participate. Since branches do not have to sponsor these students, they may apply on their own. Justice Sandra Day O'Connor advocated for this type of education years ago! There will be more information coming soon.

#### **NCCWSL**

Next May (2023), the National Conference for College Women Student Leaders (NCCWSL) will be held IN PERSON at the University of Maryland. Our branch is prepared to send one or two college students to the Conference just outside of Washington D.C. This sponsorship includes airfare, conference fees and a meal stipend. They can tour Washington on the day prior to the convention, sign up for workshops catering to their interests, and meet many volunteer mentors.

#### **Tech Trek**

Last year we sent 9 former Tech Trekkers to the virtual program. From their responses, Zoom programming was not as worthwhile as actually physically attending. Past recipients have valued meeting mentors and other students in person as a large part of the experience. Since Stanford University is no longer allowing Tech Trek camps on their campus, we are in the process of deciding where we can send our girls.
