## **February General Meeting**

What's In a Name? The Heritage Controversies at Stanford University and In Palo Alto, CA

Join us on Saturday, Feb 11 at 2:00 pm on ZOOM to learn more about recent heritage controversies at Stanford University and in Palo Alto that are resulting in the renaming of streets and buildings, the removal of statues, and more. You'll hear about the issues and community concerns; conflicts with Stanford's identity; new approaches to interpreting local history and how new names are chosen.

Most of us have heard about name changes and statue removal in the national news. City and state government buildings and properties are being looked at under a magnifying lens of representation, truth and tolerance. The stories that are emerging from these journeys to *look behind the curtain* are changing the literal landscape of thousands of buildings, parks, and facilities. These stories are filled with a wide range of emotions, from anger and sadness to frustration and concern.

Our presenter for the day will be Dr. Laura Jones, University Archeologist and Executive Director for Stanford University. Dr. Jones is responsible for stewardship of the university's nearly 200 archaeological sites and advises the university on preservation of historic buildings and landscapes. Please join us for this interesting, and sometimes controversial, presentation.

## AAUW California Presents a Webinar: *The Kindness of Color*

Two families: one Japanese American and one Mexican American. Two true stories of their separate battles with racism, incarceration, and school segregation in the World War II era. Unexpectedly, their lives intersect, paving the way for a landmark court decision in California. Join author and descendant Janice Munemitsu for the intimate story of her grandfather's arrest and her family's experiences during the interment of the Japanese in World War II. She explains how the kindness of friends and strangers provided hope and strength to persevere against unjust treatment. Although it was an unfair and harrowing experience, Ms Munemitsu shares a very positive outcome thanks to the kindness of others.

AAUW California Celebrates *Black Women in History* for Black History Month

Many Black women have made significant contributions to history, society, innovation, science, government, civil rights, women's rights, and much more. For Black History month we celebrate the achievements of but a few:

**Toni Morrison** (1931-2019) released her novel *Beloved* in 1987, winner of the Pulitzer Prize, based on the true story of an African American enslaved woman. In 1993, Morrison became the first Black woman to win the Nobel Prize in Literature. For more information go to:

Mae Jemison became the first Black woman to fly to space on the space shuttle *Endeavour*. She was also the first Black woman admitted to the astronaut training program, in 1987. Born in Alabama and raised in Chicago, Jemison graduated from Stanford University with degrees in chemical engineering as well as African and African-American studies.
