ERA at 100, December 13, 2023

It's been 100 years. Not one more #ERA100

This date marks 100 years since the introduction of the Equal Rights Amendment (ERA) in the House of Representatives. On this anniversary AAUW gathered in solidarity in Washington, D.C. and across the country to acknowledge that not one more year will pass without our rights being protected.

The ERA reads as follows:

Section 1: Equality of rights under the law shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any state on account of sex.

Section 2: The Congress shall have the power to enforce, by appropriate legislation, the provisions of this article.

Section 3: This amendment shall take effect two years after the date of ratification.

There was a deadline put on the passage of the ERA. 38 states needed to ratify it before the deadline, only 35 ratified it, three short of passage. Since then, three more states have ratified it bringing the total to 38.

AAUW's strategy for final recognition of the ERA is to support two congressional resolutions that work in concert with one another.

HJ Res 25 removes the time line and recognizes the ratification of the ERA. *HJ Res* 82, the *ERA Now* resolution, instructing the archivist to publish the ERA as the 28th Amendment.

We have also supported the *discharge petition* which would force a vote in the House of Representatives on HJ Res 25. There are currently 201 members of Congress signed on. 218 signatures are needed to force a vote.

Please contact your Senators and Representatives to support the ERA.

Public Policy AAUW CA Lobby Days April 2 and 3, 2024

We encourage all AAUW California members to participate in this act of advocacy that is essential for achievement of our legislative priorities. In addition to our members, we plan to invite college students to join the event. Their participation will enable us to reach more legislative offices, and we hope that this introduction to our organization will inspire these advocacy-minded young people who share our values to join AAUW.

We are planning a hybrid event with meetings scheduled over Zoom as well as in person at the Capitol. Members who live near Sacramento may participate in person. Legislative offices are willing to meet virtually or in person, and the virtual option makes it easier for AAUW members around the state to participate.

Training materials on the bills and the event will be posted on the state website in mid-March, and a mandatory training webinar will be held on March 25th.

Lobby Days provide a wonderful opportunity to meet with your legislators and advocate for legislation to promote gender equity and improve the lives of women and girls. We hope that you will join us in this important activity to advance our values.

An interest survey including a registration form will arrive in your inbox mid-January. Be sure to complete and return the form to be added to the communications list for the event.
