Scholarship Committee

Cindy Robbins-Roth and Jean Perry Verley

This spring, our committee interviewed 10 impressive students from all three of our county community colleges. We selected 5 outstanding students to receive Ethel Gayman scholarships of \$6,000 each. Our five recipients demonstrated the ability to persevere through huge challenges to achieve their academic goals and maintain superior grades. This was done with a lot of support from peer groups and mentors.

Samantha Guerrero will be majoring in civil engineering at UC Berkeley this fall. Her path began with an early interest in math and science, evolving into a fascination with civil engineering. Samantha found herself drawn to the intersection of structural engineering and sustainability in the face of climate change and limited resources.

At 17, she became a primary care giver for her younger siblings. She was able to stay connected to her academic goals by tutoring kids in math and science. Living in Pacifica brought home the impact of climate change and waste on vulnerable communities. Samantha plans to put her civil engineering degree to work using structural engineering to create infrastructure able to withstand the challenges of climate change.

Diana DeMartini is heading to her top pick, UC Berkeley's Haas School of Business, where she will major in business administration, followed by an MBA. This career path had its roots in her own introduction to financial literacy as a survival skill. Diana and her mother moved to Germany when she was young, where her mom got a piano teaching certificate to start her music school. COVID and the invasion of Ukraine, where many of Diana's family members still live, have created financial and emotional stress for her family.

At the College of San Mateo, Diana studied government policies that impact families and researched ways to use financial planning to empower underserved communities. Diana plans to use her advanced education to become a financial planner, focused on guiding families toward achieving their financial and life plans.

Me Me Hlaing Oo will be majoring in Sociology and minoring in Gender and Women's studies at UC Berkeley. Three years into her medical training it was interrupted by the coup in Myanmar. Me Me began work as a nurse in secret community hospitals. While her parents pushed for her to finish her medical training, her exposure at Skyline College to social sciences and liberal arts classes as well as joining the Sexual and Gender Alliance club was the catalyst of her evolution to the social sciences.

She realized that education can provide her a lens through which she can question societal structures and create change. She plans graduate studies, continued contribution to the community as a lifelong learner and teacher, "with the humble will to use education as a practice of freedom."

Jia Haria will be majoring in Neuroscience at UC Berkeley. Her interest in the human brain began with a research project at the College of San Mateo. As a STEM honor student, Jia, also participated in the Women's Mentoring and Leadership Academy, providing tutoring and receiving support on her journey.

Jia chose this major to learn more about the human brain and its behavior mechanisms, with the aim of working in healthcare, social services and basic science research. Given the incredible complexity of the brain and behavior, Jia hopes to learn how to use emerging neuroscience technology to drive research and analysis that ultimately can help people with serious, currently poorly treated, brain disorders.

Heba Alazzeh will be majoring in computer science at UC Berkeley. She plans graduate studies in sociology, developing solutions that prevent technology from further marginalizing vulnerable communities. While at the College of San Mateo, Heba worked on a number of internships and projects including, among others, supporting web services for the community colleges to support student accessibility and sites for faculty. In her spare time, she worked on food drives with her mosque and Second Harvest Food Bank. Heba's goal is to bridge research with real-world implementation to ensure emerging technologies focus on fairness, accessibility, and inclusivity. She is committed to using her education to dismantle oppressive systems and create inclusive digital policies.

The Ethel Gayman/AAUW Scholarship Fund

The AAUW San Mateo Branch signed a Memo of Understanding (MOU) with the San Mateo County Community Colleges Foundation regarding the Ethel Gayman Scholarship Fund, which is administered by the SMCCCF, to change the fund to a *pass-through* fund. It allows the Branch to distribute the funds as they see fit. This means there are no restrictions on the number of scholarships that may be awarded. Below is a synopsis of the MOU.

The Ethel Gayman/AAUW Scholarship Fund

The San Mateo Branch, American Association of University Women ("Donor") and the San Mateo County Community Colleges Foundation ("Foundation") establish the Ethel Gayman/AAUW Scholarship Fund ("Fund") to be held, administered, and distributed by this Fund Agreement.

- Charitable Purpose of Donation
 To provide awards for full-time students at College of San Mateo, Skyline College, and Cañada College who transfer to four-year institutions of higher learning accredited by the American Association of Colleges and Universities.
- 2. Selection Criteria Recipients will be selected in accordance with the criterion of the Donor and the general policies in effect for scholarships at College of San Mateo, Cañada College, and Skyline College, including the passage of Proposition 209, which restricts scholarship selection on the basis of race, sex, color, ethnicity, or national origin.

Applicants must show evidence of the following for consideration:

- 1. Be enrolled full time at College of San Mateo, Skyline College, or Cañada College,
- 2. Have attained a minimum of a 3.5 GPA,
- 3. Demonstrate financial need, and
- 4. Indicate a definite plan to transfer to a four-year institution.

The Award winners will be selected by the Scholarship Committee of the San Mateo Branch of American Association of University Women from applications provided by the San Mateo Community Colleges Foundation and interviews with selected applicants.

1. The Fund shall be administered as a pass-through scholarship fund under the provisions of the Foundation's Fee Schedule, as it is amended from time to time.

San Mateo County Community Colleges Ranked Among the best in California

Top Community Colleges for Return on Investment

A state-wide analysis of Return On Investment (ROI) across 327 community colleges shows that the 3 San Mateo County community colleges are in the top 10.

Using a Price-to Earnings Premium (PEP) metric, they assessed how quickly students recoup their educational costs based on net price and median earnings 10 years after enrollment. All 3 of the San Mateo Community Colleges ranked in the top 10. Skyline College was number 1, Cañada College was number 5, the College of San Mateo was number 8. Congratulations to the San Mateo County Community College District!

AAUW should be very proud of our contributions to these deserving students.
